MUSINGS for DECEMBER

What is advent? "It is waiting, hoping, giving shape to our dreams, it is all a part of the human condition. To dream of a world of peace and justice where Gods goodness is all in all, and to wake to its realization, is a cherished human hope. So it is, the church waits for Jesus in Advent. Poised, we are alert to the signs of the times in nature, Scripture, newspaper, ready

to greet wherever the Christ appears. The Promise comes in unexpected peace blossoming like a garden in winter, in the wake-up call of an unlikely prophet, in the sudden courage to risk bringing God's future into being, in Mary's risk to bring Jesus in to the world. Advent's color can be purple or deep blue. At Bremerton United Methodist Church, we use blue, the color of the sky just before the first rays of sunrise wake the rooster to announce to the watchers the dawning of the new day."

These words above were written in a curriculum guide in *Imagining the Word*. Arts and Lectionary resource, Volume 3 back in 1996. I simply took them and wrote them to fit our church. I loved this curriculum source. I loved the art that would be chosen to view, as one looked at a poem or song, or writing. I think of these words, as we begin *The Redemption of Scrooge* as our Advent/Christmas study and worship themes which we will explore this year. This theme is based on Charles Dickens's *A Christmas*

Poised, we are alert to the signs of the times in nature,
Scripture, newspaper, ready to greet wherever the Christ appears.

Carol and we'll explore the world of Ebenezer Scrooge, Tiny Tim, and the Cratchits, with an eye to Christian faith. Along the way we will meet the Ghosts of Christmas Past, Present, and Yet to Come and learn about living with and for others in a world blessed by Jesus.

I believe that this will be a fresh new way to hear the Christmas story this year, and find that we don't own the culture we are a part of, that God comes in and surprises us again, on turning everything upside down...and finding that God is the one who owns our culture, our secular places and our spiritual places. We will also find, that the same issues that Charles Dickens's writes about in his book, are still issues we are facing today.

And so, we pray that God, during this season of Advent, will move our hearts forward from those days, when we thought Christmas Eve was about us, to this day when we proclaim Jesus' wish list of good news, release, recovery, freedom, and favor. We do this because this is God's story, and through grace, it is our own.

One had been truly touched by one of their homeless friends who is dying of liver cancer. This friend told him, " get off alcohol, get off drugs. You won't want this liver cancer. Get out and eat right and exercise. Change your life! " So, he was sharing how he is trying to do just that!

After singing, the clothes are blessed, and our special guests are given plastic bags and invited to find items of clothing that would be helpful to them. It is such a special day, with many so grateful for having people welcome them, and making them feel at home. Thanks to all who brought items in. Next year, we will need to focus on more gloves for men, and new socks for all ages.



MONEY MATTERS

Our financial balance information for 2017 is nearing completion and planning for 2018 is well underway. We still have a significant deficit in our operational budget for 2017 with a net income of --\$184,224 at the end of September. This has been an ongoing issue. We have been able to withdraw money from our reserves to balance the budget; however the reserves are diminishing. The leadership group of the church has been diligently working on this as have you through your faithful giving. This is not a problem that can be quickly or readily resolved and is an issue confronting many churches. Within our church, we believe that progress is being made and we remain hopeful through God's grace, love and hard work that a balanced operating budget can be reached. Many lives have been transformed, love shared, services provided, and faith journeys inspired and strengthened throughout the life of the church to which we are witnesses.

In our building project, we currently have \$407,820 from the \$619,000 that has been raised however, we still need approximately \$130,000 to complete the project by February 2018 under the contracted limit of

\$750,000. We are excited about the work that is being done and our unfolding vision.

Thank you to all of you for your presence, love, generous



giving, your faith and way of living. Thank you for your prayers and stewardship in so many different ways. Many of you have already placed your 2018 financial commitment cards in the offering plate. Thank you so much. For those who have been unable to do so, please continue to give this your prayerful consideration and return your commitment cards as soon as possible. You can mail them to the office, put them in the offering plate or hand them to Debbie Thompson, Larry Watson, Marta or myself. Every contribution is important and furthers God and Jesus' presence, love and work in our community and world.

Construction Continues

For weeks we have watched our new addition growing and changing. Some steps have gone so amazingly fast. Other changes are more gradual. As you stand in the parking lot you can look through the openness and see how the 4 individual restrooms are framed in on the left side. Across the openness on the right will be the "gathering space" where we can have coffee sharing and fellowship. We plan an area to sit and visit, have a class or small group gathering.

In the next few weeks we will see the roof framed after all the trusses are set; the windows will be framed and set; and the exterior glass doors will be added to the front and side wall by the ramp. Meanwhile, interior framing, drywall and other inside work will continue, even if we can't see it happening.

Our goal is that we will have raised the necessary funding (even if we have to borrow from ourselves) by the time that the construction is complete. We hope not to take out a loan. Thank you to all of you who have pledged, and paid off your pledge from 2015-2017. You have another chance to help with a pledge for 2018-2020 time frame. Having a total pledge amount allows the church's finance team and the building committee to make plans for getting bills paid. You also might like to underwrite buying a specific item that we will need, thus saving that amount from the total due. (See the poster, the list and estimated costs of suggested items.)

Keep Your Eyes Peeled

Beforehand, hang treats to a room's ceiling with yarn and tape—high enough so family members will have to stretch to reach them. Gather in another room. Say: Close your eyes and I'll lead you somewhere. No peeking until I tell you which direction to look for good gifts.

When you're in the treat room, say: Put your chin on your chest and look only at the ground! What good things do you see? (Answers might include shoes, feet, carpet, furniture, and so on). Say: Now put your hand above your eyes and look only straight ahead. What good things do you see? (Pause for answers.)

Say: Keep your hand above your eyes and look only to the right. What good things do you see? (Pause for answers, and then repeat for the left.) Say: On the count of three, look up for good things!

After enjoying the treats, read Psalm 136:1. Ask: What are some surprising places you find gifts from God? How can we thank God for his good gifts?

Lot Bod Love

Good questions help children process what they've learned. They also help kids own their faith and think more deeply about it. Intriguing questions move beyond Bible verses and lessons to how they relate to children's own lives. It's important to spark kids' imaginations and move into life application. Thought-provoking questions make kids pause to think about their answers rather than blurting out pieces of memorized trivia. Let children share their opinions and personal experiences. When they start opening up, listen attentively and actively. And don't be afraid of getting a question in return that you don't know the answer to. This can be a time of humility to show kids that it's okay not to have all the answers. Here are some other ways to launch meaningful conversations with children:

Table Tents Make simple table tents (like restaurants use to advertise desserts!) for mealtimes. Have family members take turns creating questions and artwork for the tents. Or use this template: http://childrensministry.com/articles/family-ministry-conversation-tent/

Devices Down Not only are phones distracting, but they're affecting children's ability to converse. Research shows that parents' use of phones hampers their kids' social skills. Device-free times are essential for in-depth conversations.

Arts & Crafts Kids of all ages enjoy being creative. While they're working on simple age-appropriate projects, they'll express themselves not only through their artwork but in response to questions you ask.

Encourage Commitments

Hypothetical questions don't require any buy-in from kids. Instead, ask life-application questions that move into real-life changes and commitments. For example, ask, "What's one thing you'll do this week to serve God?" or "How can we work together to tell others about Jesus?" Then be sure to follow through.

Take Time to Debrief Debriefing questions help children make discoveries about how the Bible relates to their lives. This is essential after Sunday school, VBS, and other faith lessons so kids make connections between faith and their day-to-day experiences.

Make It a Game Help older kids and preteens open up by turning question -and-answer time into a game. Brainstorm a list of "Would You Rather?" questions, or use the "Preteen Throw and Tell Ball" (https://www.group.com/product/9781470720346-preteenthrow-tell-174-ball-this-or-that.do).

Start Shuffling Card games such as Uno, which don't require much focus, are perfect for encouraging discussions. Once you fall into a groove, you can easily start a discussion—one that may turn more meaningful than who has to draw four.





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Dear Church,

As we move closer into having some important training here for our neighborhood, as we build resiliency in our community for when emergencies happen, this is what we can begin doing right now in our own homes. The more people who have supplies in their home, the more prepared the neighborhood is. Thank you for getting your supplies ready.

What to Put in your Emergency Kit

There are many excellent resources for building your emergency kit available on the internet. For example, The Red Cross, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and Ready.gov all have recommendations for emergency supplies.

Consider what items are important for your specific situation as you gather materials. Think about special needs for the elderly, young children, pets, and people with medical concerns.

Certain geographical locations may require additional supplies; for example, if you live in a location with very cold winters, consider adding stocking caps and other warm clothing to your kit. And if you live in a rural area that may be difficult to reach during a disaster, think about adding supplies that will last five or more days.

Here are some non-exclusive suggestions for building your emergency kit:

- A three-day supply of water (one gallon per person, per day)
- A three-day supply of non-perishable food (which could include items that don't require heating, such as granola bars and peanut butter), plus a manual can opener, and utensils
- Cash in small denominations
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- Battery-powered or crank radio with extra batteries
- Crank, solar, or battery-operated power source for charging cell phone and other small electronics
- Multi-purpose tool, such as a Swiss army knife
- Emergency contact information for friends and family
- Blankets or sleeping bags
- Whistle
- Wrench or pliers

- Local maps with evacuation routes marked
- Personal hygiene supplies, such as trash bags, baby wipes, and feminine hygiene items
- Fire extinguisher
- Duct tape
- Matches
- Bug spray

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A first aid kit is a very important component of any emergency kit. Again, consider what items might be necessary for your particular situation as you build your kit. Non-exclusive suggestions for building a first aid kit include:

- Antiseptic cleansing wipes
- Antibiotic ointment packs
- Aspirin
- Antacids
- Bandages, sterile gauze, and tape
- Hydrocortisone
- Vinyl gloves
- Thermometer
- Scissors
- Tweezers
- Prescription medications and a list of medications taken
- Extra glasses

Once you've gathered these items, store them in a safe location.
